AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE

United Neighborhoods of Evansville is occasionally asked to support/endorse and/or make a stand on one political cause or another. If we were to do this, we lose our people power, our neighborhood resident support, and our ability to provide a common ground for vetting ideas. If UNOE or its associated neighborhoods were to start taking positions on the political checklists, then we would become nothing more than an extension of City/County government. (At least in the eyes of the people we represent.) Our Board positions are volunteer positions and pay nothing. As a volunteer and Board member of UNOE myself, I personally would not be involved with this group if I believed it was a rubber stamping entity of whichever political party was in control. Or if it traditionally aligned itself with one party/position or another. Even though UNOE has a lot of people that are active in City government/politics, it should remain a neutral body of representation.

UNOE serves a greater purpose and facilitates a method of communication that is not found anywhere else in the City/County body. It is a neutral zone that allows some of the ideas and problems of our days to find a point of fruition. And it ushers in a means of government to citizen and citizen to government communications that is not found in any other group or entity in town. For example, an open neighborhood meeting can relieve tension among residents and tension in the relationships that we share with City/County officials. UNOE provides a medium by which City and some County problems can be presented, discussed, and mitigated in a format that is fruitful.

We must always be vigilant in accepting and airing all beliefs and ideas as a means of communication and understanding. We must always be free to make our own decisions without fear of rejection or reprisals from any other group or party. I have found that ignorance is my biggest foe. Ignorance builds walls and promotes fear. And the means to eliminate ignorance is in part through neighborhood meetings and by allowing people and parties to verbally paint their ideas/problems/solutions on the imaginary canvas of life.

UNOE's purpose and the platform should remain neutral to our community to better flourish ideas and the principals they stand on. Without this long standing policy, Evansville would lose its only non-partisan forum in town to bring about new ideas and to mitigate other neighborhood concerns.

WEST NILE VIRUS: How Can I Reduce the Number of Mosquitoes Around My Home and Neighborhood??

To reduce mosquito populations around your home and neighborhood, get rid of any puddle or standing water available for mosquito breeding. Mosquitoes will breed in any puddle or standing water that lasts for more than **four days**. Here are some simple steps you can take:

- **D**ispose of, or empty, any water-holding containers on your property, like buckets or flowerpots.
- Pay special attention to discarded tires that may have collected on your property. Tires are a common place for mosquitoes to breed.
- Drill holes in the bottom of garbage containers that are left outdoors to let water drain out.
- Clean clogged roof gutters; remove leaves and debris that may prevent drainage of rain water.
- Turn over wading pools and wheelbarrows when not in use.
- Do not allow water to stagnate in birdbaths. Aerate ornamental ponds or stock them with fish.
- Keep swimming pools clean and properly chlorinated: remove standing water from pool covers.
- Use landscaping to eliminate standing water from pool covers.
- Repair failed or discharging septic systems. Preferred breeding areas are water contaminated by manure and septic.
- Remove tall weeds and grass.

SCOOTERS - TIME FOR CHANGE

n the summer of 2011, the Evansville Police Department was inundated with reports of stolen scooters and investigated several accidents inolving scooters. One of the accidents involved a family whose vehicle was hit by two juveniles on a scooter. The family vehicle was totaled nd they didn't have the funds to replace it. The parent of the operator of the scooter had no money either and insurance coverage is not reuired to operate scooters. The owner of the car was unable to recover their money from an accident that was not their fault. Because of this articular incident, and the sheer volume of scooters on the road, Detective K. Montgomery started a campaign to try and change the current motorized bicycle" laws.

he current law states a motorized bicycle is a 2 or 3 wheeled vehicle that is propelled by an internal combustion engine or a battery powered otor. It must have an automatic transmission, a maximum design speed of not more than 25 mph and a 2 horsepower under 50cc motor. here are no driver's license requirements for operators of a motorized bicycle but the operator must have a valid ID card. An operator of a otorized bicycle can be as young as 15 years of age. Between the ages of 15 up to 18, the rider must wear a helmet and goggles. he current law applies to the first motorized bicycles made in the early 1900's. The Evansville Police Department feels the law is antiquated nd does not reflect the motorized bicycles we all see on the street today. Therefore, we have gone before the General Assembly of Indiana sking that these modes of transportation they choose to classify as "motorized bicycles" be required to be registered through the BMV and old liability insurance. We feel it is in the best interest of the public and the operator of a motorized bicycle to attend a scooter operator class imilar to that given to a motorcycle rider.

uring the first session of the Indiana General Assembly, the House transportation committee approved a registration requirement under B1197. The Senate changed the bill to include insurance so the bill had to go back to the House. Upon its return to the house, the bill was eft to die.

uring the upcoming session of the Indiana General Assembly, the motorized bicycle issues will be addressed yet again. Any support you can ffer would be greatly appreciated. The contact information for all the members of the Indiana General Assembly transportation committee embers is available on their website. In order for your opinion on the subject to be considered, make sure you include that you are a registered voter.




