Town Hall Meeting October 15th, 2012, 6:30pm Room HP 1027—Health Professions Center, University of Southern Indiana

This town hall meeting, sponsored by State Representative Gail Riecken, will give residents a chance to air their concerns about the operations of the State's Department of Child Services (DCS) and offer solutions to improve those services. The town hall is designed to supplement the work presently being done by a legislative study committee examining the current level of services offered to at-risk children in Indiana.

"It is very difficult for many people to take time away from work to travel to Indianapolis to attend the study committee meetings, which are being conducted exclusively at the Statehouse," Ms. Riecken said. "But we feel that they deserve the opportunity to be heard, and we want to make sure their testimony is part of the deliberations as we attempt to find solutions to the problems that caused this committee to be formed."

"We have to give area people who have been affected by this issue—including parents, health care givers, local law enforcement and other advocates—every chance to tell their stories," she continued.

"Since they are the people who deal with this system first-hand, we also believe they should get the chance to offer ideas that can help DCS respond more quickly and thoroughly to keep our kids safe," Riecken said. "Their participation is important to have in hand before the committee wraps up its work at the end of October."

The Wesselman Nature Society will be hosting TREEmendous Tree Tours to showcase the



champion trees of Vanderburgh County, on Saturday, November 3. The tours will include bus tours throughout Vanderburgh County, and walking tours and activities at the Wesselman Woods Nature Preserve

Knowledgeable tree specialists will guide one hour free walking tours to showcase the champion trees located in Wesselman Woods Nature Preserve at 10 a.m. & 12 p.m. Times for Bus tours will be 8 a.m.-11 a.m. for the west side of Vanderburgh County, and 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. on the east side of the county. Bus tour participants may enjoy a lunch, included with a bus tour ticket purchase, in the nature center at 11:15. A slideshow of significant trees of Vanderburgh County that are not on the tours we be given at 11:15. The slideshow is free, and open to the public. Several family-oriented hands-on tree activities will be offered there as well from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. There will also be a silent

auction for raising funds for the printing of a new Big Tree Booklet to be printed in 2013.

The walking tours, slideshow, and family activities at the Nature Center are free to the public. The bus tours are \$15 per person for one tour, or \$20 per person for both tours, and lunch is included for either tour. Seating is limited, and is first reserved, first served. Reservations must be made by calling 479-0771 ext 102 before noon on Friday, November 2. Those coming on bus tours should come 15 minutes early to find a place to park and get to the buses on time. Buses will leave promptly at departure time. There will be no rest stops during either tour, so participants should plan accordingly. No pets or alcoholic beverages will be allowed on the bus.

The Treemendous Tree Tours are brought to you by the Wesselman Nature Society, in partnership with the City of Evansville's Department of Urban Forestry. The bus tours are generously sponsored by American Eagle Tree Service.

YARD WASTE AND LAWN CLIPPINGS

An Illicit Discharge is defined in the City of Evansville Municipal Code as: "Any discharge to a municipal separate storm sewer (MS4) conveyance that is not composed entirely of storm water, except naturally occurring floatables, such as leaves or tree limbs that are not deliberately concentrated. Sources of illicit discharges included sanitary wastewater, septic tank effluent, car wash wastewater, oil disposal, radiator flushing disposal, laundry waste water, roadway accident spillage, household hazardous wastes, and **deliberately concentrated yard waste.**"

The City Engineer's Office and the Storm Water Coordinator are requesting that Citizens of the City make an effort to comply with this Ordinance by collecting and disposing of grass clippings, leaves, limbs, etc. in a proper manner. Blowing or sweeping these materials into the roadway or curb line deliberately is a direct violation. These leaves can be carried down the curb line and into the storm drainage system blocking the flow of storm water leaving the city streets and surrounding property. These materials will also decay and cause the streams and rivers to be contaminated.

It is important to remember that everything we do in our city has an impact on our environment.

All of the City Streets drain to the Ohio River and therefore, everything that goes into the streets and street drains are also going to go to the Ohio River.

The following is a list of suggested practices for yard clean up and routine maintenance:

- Blow or rake leaves and grass clippings back into your lawn. This add nutrients to your lawn.
- Empty mulch bag into a garbage bag and dispose of properly. Do not put into ditches or swales.
- Use a compost pile or compost barrel.
