

They were applying for an alcohol license.

We reached out thru NextDoor.com and Facebook to neighbors from all over the South-Side. They voiced their opinions thru these outlets and by phoning me. I took those sentiments with me when I spoke at the meeting that day. When I entered the meeting, I was also glad to see such a strong support group from Goosetown, Akin Park, Ballard, Bellemeade/Bayard Park, Glenwood, Greater Lincolnshire, Presidents, University South, Tepe Park, Blackford's Grove and Downtown Neighborhood Associations. I also want to make mention that I think its commendable of Evie Waddell to want to become a business entrepreneur and hope in the future the associations can come and support him in his endeavor because we need more entrepreneurs in which to make this great city we call Evansville a destination place to live and be entertained!


DMD Neighborhood Map Ready For Purchase


Unlicensed Tree Workers Ripping Off Local Customers

Recently our office (Evansville Dept. of Urban Forestry) was made aware of some men from Kentucky going door to door offering to do tree work. These men are not licensed to do tree work in Evansville, [which is a violation of Evansville city ordinances).

They were paid up front by two different people on 2 different sides of town, did half the work and took off, never coming back to finish work they were paid to do. We had a similar incident happen last year...one week before Christmas, a group from Illinois came to Evansville and did the same thing to three home owners on 3 different sides of town.

These people are very difficult to catch, and, unless a contract is signed by the customer, there is little the police can do about it either. We highly recommend that homeowners only hire tree companies that are licensed [in Evansville] and insured. Do not take their word for this, but call our office to verify if they have a license and if they are insured. We also recommend to NEVER pay people up front to do tree work. Wait until the work is done to your satisfaction before you pay

them. Have some sort of contract written up with both your signatures, and make sure you get a copy.



If you are approached by someone going door to door looking for tree work and if you suspect they are not licensed, please call our office to let us know. Also, please call us if you see people doing tree work in your neighborhood that do not have business names or labels on their trucks. There's a good chance that those people may not be licensed."

Keep Your Pets Safe During the Holidays

We want everyone to be safe during the holidays, but we sometimes don't consider what we need to do to keep our pets safe during this won-

derful time of year. Did you know many holiday plants like holly, mistletoe, poinsettias, and lilies are poisonous to your They can cause vomiting, diarrhea, and even death. Check with your vet for any questions, but be on the safe side by keeping your pets away from holiday plants. There are also several ways your pets could get injured while investigating your Christmas tree. Keep your pets from chewing on live or fake needles. The needles will not digest and could be painful. Do not let your pets drink tree water. It could contain toxic chemicals. Secure your tree to the wall to prevent rambunctious pets from tipping it over and never decorate with real food. Avoid decorating with glass ornaments or tinsel. Both can be very dangerous if eaten. A simple barrier around your tree can avoid most hazards. Be careful with candles. Pets, especially cats, can be attracted to the heat and light and may hurt themselves or cause a fire. Let's all be safe this season and watch out for our smaller family members.

ARE YOU READY???

Whenever there is a conversation about disaster preparedness people say, 'well it's not going to happen here, or to me, or don't have the time to prepare, or I don't have the money or the space to prepare. But I'd like to if it was only easy, and then of course I don't know how to get started!

So here is a easy to get started list that will help you under all kinds of different and challenging situations. SO GET READY... 'cause here it comes!

- 1. First, of course, is having EXTRA WATER stored in case you need it. The least expensive way to do this is 2 liter soda bottles well rinsed, a couple drops of bleach added, and filled with tap water- dip the lid in a mild solution of bleach water, seal and date. Store them in the back of a closet, on the shelf, or under the bed so you'll have it when you need it. Do not use milk jugs because you can't reliably remove the milk sugars. If you start with city water you should be safe for drinking, cooking, and hygiene. Rain or puddle water can be collected to flush toilets.
- 2. Second, a reliable and safe SOURCE of LIGHT- a good choice is flashlights and extra batteries, and light tubes (check out the after Halloween sales.) Plan to not use candles since they are so often the cause of fires, or at least place your burning candle in a shallow pan with water in the bottom. Include a lighter & matches.
- 3. Third- Put away several days at least, of several of your favorite FOODS that do not need heat to eat or refrigeration to stay safe. Don't forget a hand operated can opener-while you may not need it today, you might become a hero to someone else tomorrow.
- 4. Start today to keep your CAR KEYS where you can always find them. Even if you're cool with losing 10 minutes every time you need them, the day will come when minutes count and you will thank yourself for this change of behavior.
- 5. CASH! We're pretty lucky because our electrical outages generally don't last very long, ice storms not included, but think about how you go about your daily business now. Do you use your plastic cards to buy fast food, or gasoline. If you're stocked up on supplies maybe you wouldn't need to leave your house or use your credit card in an emergency, but if you wanted to buy bottled water, and the ATM machine wasn't working, or if you needed food or baby diapers or cigarettes and you didn't have any cash, are you then searching the couch cushions for quarters?
- It's a good idea to stash small denominations of paper money so that you have the option when you need it. Remember, you don't want to have one 50 dollar bill and need to buy 5 dollars worth of batteries because people aren't going care about making change for you!
- 6. Get a CRISIS BUDDY! Have that chat honestly with a friend, or neighbor you trust, and decide to have each others back when things get tough. We're not talking about adopting each other's children, just finding a comfort level based on mutual reliance.
- 7. Build a "GRAB and GO BINDER"--This is how you keep your paper life safe, portable and accessible in an big emergency. Do you know anyone who could produce proof of who they are, knows all the telephone numbers and account numbers, and all the passwords, and all the companies, and billing addresses of all of the obligations in their lives? Could you pay your mortgage, prove this is your lost dog and that he has had his shots or reclaim your car? Without proper documents how do you get your medicines replaced, show you have health insurance or prove this is your child if you were separated! How do you claim your savings or bank accounts, retirement income, or get a new job?

Start immediately to gather your important papers and build a ring binder with copies of your vital information. If you are computer savy, flash drives can be the answer. Think about ways to safely store this information, including leaving a copy with someone you trust, and/or tell someone else the location and then keep it in a different location fir back up.

8. COMMUNICATIONS!

I'll bet you would want your family and friends to know that you're safe, discuss how to join up together, or let them know if you need their help! But how do you do this if you have no pre-designed plan of communication, or the electric grid is down, or you don't have your phone and your list of contact numbers?

First you create a plan that everyone knows. Perhaps an out of town person is the central contact that can receive texts from out of state. This way you only have to know one contact number and they can help coordinate info coming in. Often long distance numbers or text messages can get thru when local calls or voice messages are clogging lines and causing dropped calls. The Red Cross mans telephone info boards to take messages between people. You could agree among family members to follow a certain walking or driving route to get home or to pick up the children and/or leave a written message posted on a a pre-agreed wall or tied to a tree, telling each other if you've had to take a different path home or that you can reassemble at a pre-agreed or new location.

- 9. Take a FIRST AIDE and a CPR COURSE. Be a hero and save some one you love, or even someone you don't even know. Maybe someone will save or help you! RED CROSS courses and info are online so you can check it out in your jammies at home. The new guidelines for CPR are done with chest compressions only, so they are less up close and personal. CHECK IT OUT!!!
- 10. JUST GET STARTED !!! In the movies when the plane is in trouble and the oxygen masks drop down, the staff always says put on your mask first before you try to help someone else! So remember, this is the most important time to take care of yourself first. Because if you don't, you can't take care of anyone else either!

So be a hero, and start now to GET READY!



MESSAGE FROM THE AMERICAN RED CROSS:

Over the past month, the American Red Cross has been canvassing the 47714 neighborhoods and attending UNOE neighborhood meetings in an effort to educate the neighbors on fire safety. Thus far, they have covered Weinbach to Dexter

and Washington to Covert touching over 1,000 homes with either a door hanger or education. The goal is to save lives and reduce the number of injuries/deaths resulting from home fires by 25% over the next five years.



The strategy to accomplish this is by asking residents:

Do you have smoke alarms?

Are they working?

How often do you test them?

Is the smoke alarm less than 10 years old? If the batteries need replaced, the Red Cross is replacing them for free and then test the alarm to make sure it is working! If the alarm doesn't work or there is no alarm, an appointment is scheduled to install up to 3 per residence while the supply last!

You can help us canvass or make contacts with the neighborhoods as we go forward the next five years. Thanks for your support in saving lives!
