## Firework Safety Tips:

Everyone loves the 4<sup>th</sup> of July and setting off fireworks is just as popular as getting together with family and friends. The Evansville Police Department wants everyone to have a great time, but not at the expense of personal safety. Fireworks can be very dangerous, so please be careful. Never let your children handle, play with, or light any fireworks. Store your fireworks in cool, dry places that children can't reach. Only use fireworks outside in open areas and keep a water supply or fire extinguisher nearby. Keep spectators at a safe distance and never aim, point, or throw fireworks at anyone. Now that you will be safe, remember to also be respectful of your neighbors. Evansville City Ordinance 9.10.020 allows for the use of fireworks during certain times of the year. The specific dates and times for the 4th of July Holiday Season are June 29th through July 9th from 5:00 pm to 11:30 pm and July 4th from 10:00 am to 12:00 am. Fireworks are only permitted to be used on private property with the permission of the owner. The use of fireworks is prohibited from being used on any public street, public park, or public area. Have a wonderful 4<sup>th</sup> of July. - Lt. Monty Guenin, EPD

# June General Meeting will have "Life On The Beat"

The Evansville Police Department will present "Life on the Beat" at our June General Membership Meeting. The Life on the Beat program was pioneered by the Cleveland Police Department in response to the public backlash following the fatal shooting of a Somali National who brandished a knife in an encounter with an officer. Police Departments nationwide use programs such as Life on the Beat to offer the community a non-hostile public forum in which information can be openly shared.

Over the last year, there have been many stories about police actions that have made local and national headlines, with Ferguson, Missouri taking center stage. Most of the stories, including some right here in the Tri-State, have involved the public's outrage towards how the police have handled some of these situations. The fact of the matter is that unless you have been a police officer, and in those situations, it can be very tough to judge exactly what happened and who did what to whom. Sometimes the police are wrong and sometimes their actions are not only justified, but necessary.

It is for that reason, the Evansville Police Department has brought the program to our city called "Life on the Beat", which puts the citizens in the shoes of the police officers by participating in reality based scenarios, in which the citizen plays the part of the police officer.

The purpose of the program is not to train people how to be a cop, but rather to give citizens a much better understanding of how and why officers react as they do to certain situations. There will be an open discussion following each scenario with the hope of opening better lines of communication between the public and the police.

During this program, EPD officers will lead discussions concerning ticketing practices, officer conduct and the use of lethal force. Additionally, there will be several opportunities for audience members to role play as officers in potentially violent situations, using training pistols against digital threats in police -training simulators. Personally, I was able to participate in this aspect during the program last fall and until you're forced to think in the moment, you can't fully understand and appreciate what an authority figure is going through. I assure everyone who attends our June meeting that they will gain a deeper appreciation and respect of what our local law enforcement officers face on a daily basis patrolling the streets of our city! Very few programs I have participated within as a neighborhood association President for 15 years have made me think as much as this one did. I fully encourage each of you to attend so that you step outside your own comfort zone into what life is really like on the beat! - Chris Cooke

# Severe Weather

Severe weather is prevalent during the summer months in Indiana. Thunderstorms can produce large hail, flash floods, heavy rain, lightning, strong winds, and tornadoes that can reach speeds in excess of 300 mph, be more than a mile wide, and cover approximately 50 miles during destruction. Thunderstorms, flash floods, and tornadoes can all appear suddenly with little warning, and may only last a few minutes, but have the strength and power to cause a great amount of damage.

#### Things to Know:

Watch: conditions are favorable for a thunderstorm, flood, or tornado. Warning: a thunderstorm, flood, or tornado is occurring or is likely to occur soon.


#### **Before Severe Weather Strikes:**

- Keep trees trimmed to avoid falling onto buildings, cars or people.
- If hail or strong winds are reported, park your vehicle under a shelter to avoid damage.
- Contact your insurance provider if you are in a flood plain. Many insurance companies do not include flood damage unless you ask.
- If in a flood plain, put hot water heaters, electrical panels, and furnaces away from the ground.
- When making a disaster kit, make sure you can take it with you in case of evacuation.
- Have basements waterproofed.
- If flooding is possible, try to create a barrier between your house and the water.

#### **During Severe Weather:**

- Postpone or cancel outdoor activities and listen to weather reports on the radio or television.
- Seek shelter inside a building or in a hardtop vehicle, but do not touch the metal inside.
- Do NOT go near tall trees or any other tall objects, or near downed power lines.
- Do NOT go under overpasses. Wind speeds increase and can cause serious injuries.
- If in a vehicle, get out and go into a strong building if possible. If not, lie in a flat ditch or low area and cover your head. Be aware of low lying areas that may flood.
- If you live in a mobile home, get out immediately. Shelter in a building with a strong foundation.
- If caught out in the middle of a body of water, return to shore as soon as possible.
- Basements, inner rooms, and storm cellars provide the best protection during a thunderstorm or tornado. Stay in the center of the room, away from doors and windows.

# Severe Weather

#### **Evacuating:**

- If flooding is possible, evacuate your house and get to higher ground. Know your town and make sure you know alternate escape routes in case one is blocked.
- Take pets with you if you evacuate. However, many shelters usually do NOT allow pets inside due to sanitary conditions, so plan accordingly.
- Do NOT try to drive through water. As little as a few inches of moving water can wash most cars away with the current.
- Do NOT drive through water rushing over a roadway. It can easily sweep your car away.
- Do NOT try to cross moving water on foot. As little as a few inches can knock you off your feet.



#### **After Severe Weather:**

- If injured, seek necessary medical care.
- If you can safely, help others who may be trapped or injured.
- Stay out of damaged buildings and any building surrounded by flood water.
- Avoid entering ANY building (home, business, etc.) until local officials indicate it is safe.
- Report broken utility lines to the appropriate authorities.
- Wear sturdy shoes and use extreme caution when entering buildings.
- Use battery powered lanterns or flashlights when examining buildings.
- Examine foundations, walls, floors, doors, staircases, and windows for cracks or other damage to ensure that the building is not in danger of collapsing.
- Watch for loose plaster, drywall, and ceilings that could fall.
- Look for fire hazards and beware of possible water, gas, or oil leaks.
- Watch out for animals, especially poisonous snakes that may have come into buildings with the floodwaters.

#### **After Returning Home:**

- Take pictures of the damage, both of the building and its contents, for insurance claims.
- Throw away food that has come into contact with floodwater.
- If water is questionable purity, boil, and distill drinking water before using.
- Pump out flooded basements gradually (about one-third of the water per day) to avoid structural damage.
- Service damaged septic tanks, cesspools, pits, and leaching systems as soon as possible.
- Contact your local health department before making repairs to septic systems.
