This 100% FREE Party Starts on Saturday, June 18th at the Tropicana Events Plaza from 3:00pm to 5:00pm.



# The Regional Neighborhood Network Conference or RNNC is coming to Evansville in 2017!

Representatives and other neighborhood leaders from 20 member cities from five States will be visiting Evansville for the 2017 RNNC on October 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, and 7<sup>th</sup>. The RNNC was last held in Evansville in 2003.

The RNNC is a time to highlight community assets and innovative initiatives. These initiatives connect existing civic engagement efforts to a regional network that will enable local neighborhood leaders to gain and upgrade their neighborhood skills and know how. The RNNC provides a forum for neighborhood leaders, municipal staff, elected officials, community development practitioners, service providers and corporations to gather and learn from each other, encounter best practices and gain valuable insight to effect positive change and transformation in their own communities. All neighborhoods and all potential neighborhood leaders would benefit from participating in the RNNC. During our upcoming June meeting, Brent Jackson, Senior Vice-President will be hosting a presentation on the RNNC. Where he will bring actual video footage from past RNNC's to show-case. EMERALD ASH BORER (EAB), a non-native, Invasive pest that is killing Ash trees across America, is now in all counties of Indiana except for Vanderburgh, Gibson and Knox counties. This means that EAB will be in Evansville very soon, if not already here. If you have an Ash tree, and if it is worth saving, and you want to save it, this year would be the time to start treating it. To protect Ash trees worth saving, it is recommended they be treated before an area is infested. Once trees are infested, it may be too late to save them. # "Earthquakes in the Midwest - A Reality Check"

For some time, there have been concerns about just what might happen to our city and all the surrounding counties if a devastating earthquake did take place. After learning more about the Wabash Valley Fault Zone, I am even more convinced it could affect our area worse than the more well-known New Madrid Zone which is farther to our south.

We are right in the Wabash Valley Fault Zone which has been proven to have magnitudes of 7.5 or higher and is way overdue for another.

I think many of you as CERT's may be surprised as to how important your training with CERT would help you in this real event.

Folks, this is a very real threat to our community. It just could be the most serious incident to happen to our area in our lifetime and we as CERT's may be the only people in our neighborhoods with the leadership and training to help save lives.

#### Watch out for the Spring Rains & Water

The City encourages you to take the following precautions when recreating along local waterways:

- o Avoid contact with urban streams during and three days after rainfall.
- o Alter recreational activities to ones that do not involve contact with water. For example, walk or bicycle along a stream rather than swimming, wading or water skiing.
- o Always wash your hands after contact with water in urban streams, especially before eating
- o Use a waterless hand sanitizer at outings that occur near urban streams.

Clean waterways are a priority for the City of Evansville. The City is implementing projects to improve our waterways and reduce combined sewage overflows. The Long Term Control Plan will significantly reduce the overflows and effects to Pigeon Creek and the Ohio River.


- 1. **Identify the needs of the people or places around you.** Neighbors may be too busy or shy to ask others for help, so just ask them what they may need help doing. Take a walk around the place you live or work. Look for areas that need sprucing, or a touch of beauty. Reach out to service organizations in the neighborhood to find out what they might need help doing. Most nonprofits have a laundry list of "To Do" items and very little time to complete them or recruit volunteers. Ask about fixer-up projects, programs or events in the works.
- 2. **Do something you love!** Do you love to cook? Read? Be outdoors? Use your passion to serve the community. Offer to cook for a neighbor, the elderly, or even your co-workers. Collect books for schools or children organizations. Cleanup litter, gutters (sewer), or pull weeds along sidewalks.
- **3. Keep it simple.** You don't need to reinvent the wheel with a service project. If you're already doing something to serve the neighborhood and can expand on it June 15th, then by all means keep it simple and do what you're great at!

#### **Fireworks Safety:**

Summer time is here and with that brings increased outdoor gatherings and celebrations. Here are some reminders and facts about fireworks. If fireworks are legal where you live and you decide to set them off on your own, follow these simple safety tips:

- Do not allow children to play with or light fireworks.
   \* This is an adult only task.
- Keep a bucket of water near where fireworks are being used, in case of a fire or mishap.
- Fireworks should be lit on a smooth, flat surface away from the house or any other building and not near dry leaves or other flammable materials.
- If a firework does not ignite, do not try to relight it. Submerge it in water, then properly dispose of it.



- Sparkler information:
- Sparklers burn at 1200 degrees
- \* Glass melts at 900 degrees
- Wood burns at 575 degrees
- Cakes bake at 350 degrees
- Water boils at 212 degrees

The best advice is to take your kids to see a professional fireworks display rather than using fireworks at home. The show is sure to be safer and much more spectacular.
