# Getting Inside the Millennial Mindset and the Change of Venue

A new element in the community is eluding many of our neighborhoods and community outreach forums alike. Younger faces seem to be missing from many of our forward facing, in person meetings, and some in the community are taking note of it. Millennials have become the target subset group of people in the community that many community leaders are seeking input. I was asked this question in a Promise Zone meeting last month. Where are the Millennials? Their absence may be due to a change of mindset. Social Media and new technologies



are playing a key role in changing the traditional meeting grounds of yesteryear. Millennials are taking to Facebook, Twitter, Snapchat, Instagram, Google & Yahoo Groups, and several other tools of technology to get their information out and to "become active" in the community. They are everywhere in cyberspace, but often appear to be nowhere in real life.

From my observations in the community, the mindset of the Millennials includes the idea that face to face, in person meetings are things of the past; that they would rather meet online or through some virtual environment to achieve the same goals. Millennials are task (or project) driven and prefer to often skip over the more menial planning and prep tasks of community projects. They just want to show up on game day, donate time and energy to a project, and then move on. Millennials want to know that their efforts are valued and that they are appreciated. If they feel as though they are unnoticed, they may become disengaged. Millennials may come off as unmotivated; however, they would rather do things on their own terms, often their own way. This doesn't mean that associations need to completely change their initiatives, but rather provide more options. I know some of these are just generalizations that I am making about millennials, but I know many would agree with me on my perceptions about them. I have heard some neighborhood leaders tell me that the older generations are more responsive to mailed newsletters than to social media or emails. Many of the older generations do not participate in social media outlets or have an email address. Conversely, many of the older generations that I have spoken with are also resolved to "never needing an email address". How many times have I heard my older neighbors in my own neighborhood tell me, "I am XX years old and I have never needed an email address in the past, and I am not starting now!" Oh my! What exacerbates the problem is the older generations with the strongly held belief and convictions that newsletters must be mailed through the post office (or hand delivered) for their inclusive participation into the neighborhood is also dying with them.

Email, Facebook Groups, <u>Nextdoor.com</u>, and other social media outlets are becoming the norm in getting the word out for many neighborhoods. There are some neighborhoods that have hundreds and even thousands of active online members. They are sharing yard sale, block party events, and neighborhood babysitter ads. Missing cats, dogs, and bikes are being found faster and returned to their owners often in the same day! Videos of criminal activity from security systems are being shared and passed around. Evidence trails are often being established as neighbors share their experiences online. I have seen conversations going in my neighborhood group at 2:30am between neighbors that heard shots fired and were discussing what direction they came from. A lot of collaboration is going on among the neighborhoods online these days that's never been seen before. And it is becoming the new meeting venue!

Social media is here to stay and a few neighborhood associations are being forced to choose between catering to their older, often more reliable people, or their younger generations, often busier and preoccupied, OR trying to do a mixture of both generations and cater to both age groups. The aging baby boomers and older neighborhood leaders are putting the torch down, or dying off causing some neighborhoods to evolve, go dark, merge, or go completely online to survive. It's different from neighborhood to neighborhood of what's going on in Evansville and what each neighborhood is deciding to do to address the evolving membership changes and demands. ### Spring Safety Tips from the Evansville Fire Department

With spring comes a feeling of renewal. Families everywhere begin cleaning out their basements and garages. Windows are opened, flowers bloom and the days grow longer. This is a good time to review a safety check list for your home.

#### Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms save lives. You should test them monthly and replace the battery at least once a year, according to the National Fire Protection Association. If the alarm makes a

"chirping" sound, replace it immediately. Smoke alarms should be located in every bedroom and in the common areas on each floor of a home. Mount them at least 10 feet from the stove to reduce false alarms, less than 12 inches from the ceiling and away from windows, doors and ducts.

Three out of every five home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms, according to NFPA.

#### **Carbon Monoxide Detectors**

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an invisible, odorless gas, and it can kill you. Anything in the home that burns fuel can potentially become a source of carbon monoxide. CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each bedroom and on every level of the home. The safety tips for CO detectors mirror those of smoke alarms: change the batteries and test them.

#### **Family Emergency Plan**

Spring is a great time to review your plan with family members to make sure they know what to do. The emergency plan should include:

- A communications plan as to how your family members will contact one another if they are not in the same place and where you should meet if it's safe to go outside
- A shelter-in-place plan if outside air is contaminated; FEMA recommends sealing windows, doors and air vents with plastic sheeting
- A getaway plan including various routes and destinations in different directions

Have a home and car emergency kit. The Federal Emergency Management Agency says an emergency kit should include one gallon per day of water for each person, at least a three-day supply of food, flashlight and batteries, first aid kit, filter mask, plastic sheeting and duct tape, and medicines. <u>Visit the FEMA website for a complete list</u>.

#### What Else Should You Do This Spring?

NSC recommends you take unwanted or expired medicines to a prescription drop box or take-back event near you, update your first-aid kit and, most of all, get outside and have fun!
