From the President

The RNNC Rally and Last Call for Volunteers!

Our UNOE office has been a been a been at this year! 2017 will mark one of UNOE's biggest and busiest years to date. By the end of this year, I am predicting that we will have spent more time, energy, and money in 2017 than what we have for any individual year in the past. By in large part, this is due to our increased role in the 2017 Regional Neighborhood Network Conference.

In comparison, the last RNNC conference in 2003, UNOE was simply responsible for the volunteers and Friday lunches. At that time, UNOE also had its own VISTA workers to assign tasks and a President who was retired and could devote 100% of his time to the project. We are not in that same position today. Personally, I still must make a living and must rely on our dedicated office staff to pick up many of these other duties. Our staff has been responsible for the registrations, decorations, program booklets, individualized conference badges, most of the itinerary development, a portion of the tours, logistics and the bookkeeping of the 2017 RNNC conference. Hours and hours of minute by minute planning has gone into the upcoming Evansville conference. These extra duties represent a much, much bigger role than what we took on in 2003.

For example, in the 2017 conference, we are planning to host up to 400 paid participants with over 100 neighbor/city volunteers and 66 Speakers. In total, we are tracking nearly 600 people for this 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ day conference. Managing ticket purchases and speaker requests is a tall order and simply take a lot of man hours. I would speculate that by the time the conference arrives, UNOE will have spent around 1000 hours of labor on preparation for the conference. Our UNOE office staff has done a lion's share of the preparatory work for this conference, and a shout out to them is much deserved. I am claiming but a minor role in the whole ensemble.

The RNNC represents a staple mark in Evansville and UNOE's history. It is important for our neighborhoods and the City of Evansville to show up with their best foot forward. I am taking off work and volunteering for all 3 days. I hope that we all do our best to represent our great city at this multi-city conference.

Safety in Places of Public Assembly



Before You Enter: Take a good look. Does the building appear to be in a condition that makes you feel comfortable? Is the main entrance wide and does it open outward to allow easy exit? Is the outside area clear of materials stored against the building or blocking exits?

Have a communication plan. Let a relative or friend know where you are in case of emergency and you are separated from family or friends.

Plan a meeting place. Pick a meeting place outside to meet family or friends with whom you are attending the function. If there is an emergency, be sure to meet them there.

When You Enter:

Take a good look. Locate all available exits immediately. Be prepared to use your closest exit. You may not be able to use the main exit.

Check for clear exit paths. Make sure aisles are wide enough and not obstructed by chairs or furniture and the exit door is not blocked or chained.

Do you feel safe? Does the building appear to be overcrowded? Are there fire sources present such as candles burning, cigarettes or cigars burning, pyrotechnics, or other heat sources that may make you feel unsafe? If you do not feel safe in, leave immediately.

React immediately. If an alarm sounds, you see smoke or fire, or some other unusual disturbance stay calm and immediately exit the building in an orderly fashion.

Get out, stay out! Once you have escaped, stay out. Under no circumstances should you ever go back into a burning building. Let trained firefighters conduct rescue operations.

Every day, millions of people wake up, go to work or school, and take part in social events. Every so often the unexpected happens: an earthquake, a fire, a chemical spill, an act of terrorism or some other disaster. Each disaster can have lasting effects — people may be seriously injured or killed, and devastating and costly property damage can occur. People entering any public assembly building need to be prepared in case of an emergency.

The Greater Lincolnshire Neighborhood Association is sponsoring its first Front Porch Festival on Sunday, Oct. 1, 2017, 4 p.m.-6 p.m.

The event is free and open to the public. We were inspired by the FPF held in the Evansville Haynie's Corner area, as well as others around the country. Those attending will be able to walk through the neighborhood with strollers, lawn chairs, etc., stopping at different houses to enjoy live music of a variety of genres. This is a family friendly event, so bust out the coolers and bring the kids.

Musicians will be playing in the entryways of homes along College Highway and Willow, between St. Benedict Cathedral and Bosse High School. Some of the musicians include the Boat Monkeys, a group of local musicians who have won the Evansville Courier and Press Readers' Choice Platinum Award for best local band for five years; Maria Roate, a Christian singer/ songwriter, originally from Evansville, now living outside Nashville, who in 2017 released a 6-song debut album; Michael Gray of the After Hours jazz band; Jennifer and Jeremy Korba of St. Benedict Cathedral; the University of Evansville Faculty Brass Quintet and the Memorial High School Jazz Band

Food will be available for sale. Chris Mills, a Lincolnshire resident, will have his Flying Pigs Barbecue food truck up and running, serving Memphis style BBQ. Jeanne's Gelato, located at the corner of Lincoln and Weinbach, will be serving up sweet cold treats. In addition, St. Benedict Cathedral will be selling their renowned chicken and dumplings.

Maps designating homes with musicians, and the names of the performers, will be available.

There will be plenty of street parking for those attending. The only streets that will be blocked are in the area known as "the little triangle": Willow at Lincoln; Bayard Park at College Highway and Bayard Park at the intersection of Willow and Southeastern. This is the area designated for the food vendors. In addition, there will be a Power Yoga class on the "little triangle" at 3 p.m.
