From the President . . .

When it comes to traveling, we often get Rights and Privileges confused.

It was June 18, 2015. I was part of the crowd that had gathered around the newly renovated exterior of the former Greyhound Bus station. The lighting of the outdoor neon sign was to be the apex of that night's event. A crowd of 600+ spilled over into the streets surrounding the building. The Mayor, City Council and the Mayor's staff gathered around the front of the entrance to announce the partners in the project and the lighting of the sign. Every news station was there. Smartphones and cameras were rolling from every which way you looked. The glow of cellphone screens was prominent, casting white ambient light on every other face. People from all walks of

life from the Evansville area could be seen. Automobile traffic came to a halt at least a block in every direction. It was a standing-room-only event. I don't think the Mayor's office or any of the promoter's knew that many people to show up for the unavailing of the renovated historic building.

Later that day, EvansvilleWatch (a group of volunteers who listen to the Evansville/Vanderburgh County 911 scanner and report incidents on Facebook), reported that a 911 caller had complained about pedestrians in the street around the bus station. The comments on the posts were interesting, especially when the Evansville Police Department chimed in. EPD commented, "It is a social event. Drivers need to drive like they have some sense and be aware of the pedestrians in the street." That was a great statement that EPD made! It's a good reminder of who has rights and who has privileges in such situations.

Mr. Don Henry was my Driver's Education teacher at Reitz High School in 1987, having taught there for over 30 years. Mr. Henry was one of those teachers that would not let you drive until you passed his driving tests with a 100% score. There were no extra points, and 99% on a test was a failing score. Mr. Henry was the kind of teacher who would drive to Indianapolis to the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles to talk with the State Commissioner about the errors he found in the Indiana Driver's manual. He eventually became a member of the board and helped to make ongoing corrections to the Indiana Driver's manual, often doing so while in class teaching.

In nearly every chapter of the Indiana Driver's manual in 1987, Mr. Henry would have us make corrections, even minute ones. One correction stood out the most pertained to a topic about who has the right-of-way in Indiana: pedestrians or drivers? One scenario he described involved a car, a motorcycle, a pedestrian and a commercial truck all arriving at a four-way intersection simultaneously, each from a different direction. Which one of them has the right of way? The manual suggested that each one slowly creep out into the intersection and each proceed carefully. Mr. Henry corrected the manual and stood solidly on the notion that the pedestrian had the right-of-way and should go first. He then posed this situation to the class: "If you don't think the pedestrian has the right-of-way, then let them get into an accident together. Who do you think is going to win in court? Of course, the answer is the pedestrian! We license and insure drivers, not pedestrians!"

When I hear drivers complain about kids or adults walking in the streets, I often think to myself that these drivers have forgotten that *they* are the *licensed* ones. They are the **privileged** ones that have been granted special permission through motor vehicle licensing to use a regulated vehicle, approved by Indiana laws, for safe travel. They seem to have forgotten that when we sign our Driver's License, we are agreeing to be held accountable to the Indiana laws on public transportation. These laws do not apply to pedestrians. As a matter of fact, the US Supreme Court ruled in Kent vs. Dulles, that pedestrians and those who do not use a motorized vehicle for hire have the right to travel and that it is a part of the liberty of which the citizen cannot be deprived without due process of law under the <u>Fifth Amendment</u>. From this viewpoint, we can go so far to say that walking, jogging and running along a public thoroughfare is a person's constitutional **right**.

When you think of walkers, joggers and bicyclists in town, do you think of a protected class of people? If you are a licensed driver using an automobile, you should. Our laws define them as such and the courts seem to agree. All I am trying to say this month is "Make way for the walkers! Make way for the joggers! Make way for the bicycle riders! It's the neighborly thing to do." 'til next month, God Bless,

Neighborhood Impact at Work!

A wonderful thing happened at the Sept. 24 City Council meeting: A residential neighborhood in Jacobsville defeated a multi-property owner and his attorney who had been pursuing a zoning variance that would have gutted an entire block of East Indiana Street, an historically R-2 neighborhood, and installed a large commercial/industrial "multitenant" warehouse in place of homes.

When the issue went before Area Plan Commission (where zoning variance request originate), a handful of nearby neighbors organized a protest to what they saw as the inevitable deterioration of their quality of life. They were vocal and persistent in their opposition, according to City Council representative, Dr. Dan Adams, who serves on the Area Plan Commission.

They were unyielding, according to the property owner's attorney, Krista Lockyear. And Monday night, they prevailed: At Adams' behest, all eight of the council members who were present for the final decision voted "nay."

We wish there had been a few Jacobsville remonstrators on hand to celebrate their success at the council meeting. But, without belaboring the obvious, we want to point out that this is **what can happen when neighbors pay attention** to each other and what's going on in their neighborhoods; when they **communicate** with each other and their elected representatives; and then remain **dedicated to following-through** with their demands.

Update on the Bridge & Route

Surveys and Field Work Continuing for I-69 **Crossing**—Preferred alternative expected this fall The I-69 Ohio River Crossing (I-69 ORX) Project Team is conducting additional survey and field work as the Indiana Department of Transportation and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet move closer to identifying a preferred alternative and publishing the Draft Environmental Impact Statement this fall.



OHIO RIVER Letters were recently mailed to more than 700 property

owners on both sides of the river alerting them to possible survey and investigation activities on their property. The people receiving letters are property owners who could be affected by one of the project alternatives. Crews started field activities late last week. The activities include visually inspecting the property, taking measurements and taking soil samples. Team members are not entering homes or other structures on the property.

In addition to the survey work, the Project Team is continuing its field work and engineering analyses. Recent field work has included bat surveys and wetland delineation. Mussel surveys will be conducted in the near future when conditions for the Ohio River and water levels are favorable. The surveys are an important part of the environmental process.

Wildlife biologists recently visited a number of bridges and overpasses in the project area, looking for any signs of bats. Bats can use bridges for day and night roosts, and it's important to document their locations. The information is shared with the Project Team, which helps the team make informed decisions and consider mitigation, if necessary.

Teams are also in the midst of wetland delineation, mapping the boundaries of wetlands in the project area. Wetlands are regulated under the Clean Water Act and it's important to determine where wetlands begin and end. The team looks at hydrology, soil and plants in the area to make the determination. The Project Team will use the information gathered to determine how the I-69 Ohio River Crossing fits best within the community.

Fall Festival Child Safety Tips





- Before you arrive at the Festival, talk with your child and tell them about the large number of people that will be there. Tell them that there will be numerous Police Officers and Officials that your child can safely approach if they become lost or separated from you. Describe what Police Officers wear.
- After you arrive at the Fall Festival, point out Police Officers & Deputies in uniform. Tell them they can go to anyone wearing a similar uniform for help. Also point out Nut Club members to your child & the distinctive straw hats with the various bands (bolo's) around their hats. Tell them they can also seek out Nut Club Members for help.
- Make sure you as a parent are constantly aware of your children's whereabouts. Children are easily distracted at the Fall Festival, with all its sights, sounds and smells. It's a prime spot to be easily distracted, even for adults.
- It is always best for parents of younger children to hold that child's hand when walking in or around the Fall Festival for numerous safety reasons.
- Make mental notes or write down what your child/ children is/are wearing or take a picture on your cell phone. If you become separated from one of your children, do not panic. Seek out the closest Police Officer, Deputy or Nut Club Member for assistance. The clothing color and style will be helpful for Officials actively looking for your child. (The better the description or photo, the easier it will be for Officials to spot your child.)
- For your children who are older and/or adults in your group, have a pre-determined meeting spot if anyone in your group becomes separated.
- If you feel your child is old enough to wander around without you, it's best if they pair up with a sibling or friend of similar age. Have them check in with you by calling or texting every 15-30 minutes to update their location. Have a predetermined time & location in order to meet at that spot when you are leaving the festival.
- Parents, it's recommended that you not allow any child younger than high school age to walk around in the games/rides area on Friday or Saturday nights without adult supervision. This becomes a VERY congested area and is known for altercations.
