Benefit Ahead for Our County Neighborhoods: Banding Together to Improve Broadband

Southwest Indiana Counties Band together for Improved Broadband

Economic development teams from Vanderburgh, Gibson and Posey Counties have joined forces to bring awareness to the need for improved broadband infrastructure in rural areas of each county.

In the 21st Century, broadband should be considered key infrastructure, yet thousands of residents of Vanderburgh, Posey and Gibson counties do not have the infrastructure needed in place. Lack of high-speed internet not only affects the quality of life for rural residents, but our region's economic opportunity to attract new business and talent.

"Citizens living in rural Southwest Indiana communities shouldn't have to make compromises in terms of education, commerce and overall quality of life due to inadequate broadband connection," stated Vanderburgh County Commissioner, Cheryl "Working alongside Musgrave. fellow commissioners and their economic development teams has strengthened our region's case for improved broadband."

Without modern broadband internet service, rural residents lack access to healthcare via telemedicine, remote learning, next generation emergency services, video streaming and more.

For rural businesses, improved broadband provides the opportunity to reach global audiences through e-commerce; for farmers to improve efficiencies through agricultural innovation; and remote workers the luxury of working from home.

In August, Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb announced \$22.1 million in funding for rural broadband infrastructure projects in 12 Indiana counties. It was the first dispersion from the state's \$100 million "Next Level Broadband" expansion program. A second round of grant opportunities is expected to be announced, and Southwest Indiana will vie for dollars.



Leading United Neighborhoods of Evansville

United Neighborhoods of Evansville's mission is carried out by Neighborhood Associations working together to preserve, enhance and promote Evansville and area neighborhoods.

Purpose. The purpose of UNOE is fulfilled through four interrelated purposes:


- 1) Define common interests and act in unison on those issues;
- 2) Encourage and facilitate neighborhood and civic involvement;
- Provide a forum for Neighborhood Associations to share information, knowledge, and expertise; and
- 4) Encourage best practices among the membership and promote the development of leadership skills.

Board Composition. The Board of Directors shall be composed of eleven officers, the Chair of each standing committee, five At-Large voting Neighborhood Association members elected by the General Membership annually, and up to four nonvoting advisory members from the community atlarge appointed by the President. The eleven officers include the President, Senior Vice-President, three Regional Vice Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, three Senior Liaisons and the Immediate Past President.

Responsibilities of Board Members include 1) attend monthly board meetings (third Wednesdays of January through November), 2) support UNOE's mission statement within the general community and 3) become familiar with and adhere to the UNOE Bylaws.



Duties of Officers

The **Board President** 1) oversees the administration of UNOE, 2) facilitates the General Membership meetings and Board of Directors meetings, 3) represents UNOE at the request of the Board of Directors and/or the General Membership, 4) with the exception of the Nominating Committee, serves as an ex-officio member of all other committees, and 5) in February each year, appoints up to four community advisory members for a one-year term.

The **Senior Vice-President** acts as president in the absence of the President, facilitates the planning of the annual Sparkplug Banquet, represents UNOE at meetings as directed by the President and/or Board of Directors, and coordinates UNOE's membership recruitment efforts.

Regional Vice-Presidents 1) attend as many meetings as possible of their respective region's Neighborhood Associations, 2) participate with larger community projects, 3) work with the city on projects to help the region's neighborhoods, 4) promote new Neighborhood Associations, 5) do other activities to enhance the region, and 6) submit a written monthly report to the Board of Directors.

The **Secretary** assures records of UNOE are maintained, including minutes of the Board of Directors and the General Meetings.

The **Treasurer** oversees an accurate and up-to-date account of the organization's finances with the aid of UNOE office staff, provides a written monthly report to the Board of Directors and the General Membership, and makes financial recommendations to the Board of Directors, including the preparation and submission of the annual budget.

The *Immediate Past President* advises the officers on past decisions of the Board, as appropriate, and may perform other duties as requested by the President and/or Board of Directors.

Senior Liaisons will mentor Board Members At-Large, represent UNOE at community events, and serve as a member of a committee.

At-Large Board Members are positions that are to be mentored and coached for inclusion into the greater leadership of UNOE as an organization. They are future office holders among UNOE's Board of Directors.

Neighborhood Lighting Survey Update

Thank you to those Neighborhood Associations who participated in the 2019 Neighborhood Lighting Survey!

Of our 45 member Neighborhood Associations, 19 submitted completed survey forms/maps. All surveys have been submitted to Vectren. (If you missed the deadline but have completed your survey, please go ahead and deliver/mail those to the UNOE office. We can continue to submit them for you and keep your originals on file.)

Brad Ellsworth, Director, Community Affairs- Indiana with Vectren, a CenterPoint energy company, has been our contact throughout the process of asking for streetlight maps for each of our Neighborhood Associations and submitting the completed surveys.

In a recent reply to survey submissions, Brad wrote, "Thanks to all Neighborhood Associations. We appreciate the extra eyes out there! Someday soon we should be able to receive individual 'lights out' reports through a system on the website. It should be easier and faster to 'let there be light.' I will let you know when that is available."

Christine Prior with the Dept. of Metropolitan Development and Promise Zone is assisting with submitting to the City Engineer reports that noted dark areas and suggestions for additional lighting.

For any of you who've submitted surveys with problem streetlights, if you notice the concerns have been addressed or fixed, we'd love to hear your stories.

As you know, improving street lighting in a neighborhood has two perspectives in regard to crime prevention: 1) increases potential offenders' perception of being caught and thus deterring them from committing a crime; and 2) demonstrates that the community cares and is interested in what happens on its streets and is more likely to notice and report when something is wrong.

Also, please remember to use the handout called **Handling Street Lighting Concerns Throughout the Year.** You can download it from our website's Resources page at www.unoevansville.org/resources or remove it from your kit, so you'll have it handy as street lighting concerns arise going forward.

Tips from the City Arborist

Beware of Deceptive People Going Door to Door Soliciting Tree Work



In the past, this time of year, or after major storms, there have been people going door to door looking for tree work, taking money from their customers before any work is done and not finishing the work or not coming back to start the work. There have also been cases of such companies leaving the cuttings on the property from the work and not coming back to dispose of them.

Several questions that home owners should ask themselves about contractors going door to door looking for work that should raise red flags...

- Why are they from out of state looking for work in our area? Why don't they have enough business where they come from?
- If they have to go door to door looking for work, is this because they have a lack of experience in the profession?
- Why do they have to be paid up front? Why can't they wait to receive payment until the job is done to my satisfaction?

These tree companies, who usually are not insured, will often give very cheap estimates for tree work that seems like a deal that is "too good to pass up." Unfortunately, that is how they deceptively outcompete our local licensed and insured tree companies. People like this are also well known to advise homeowners to top their trees, which is one of the worst things that can be done to a tree.

Deceptive people are very difficult to catch, especially if they do not sign a legitimate contract. They often claim that they are "licensed and insured," but are not. We highly recommend that homeowners in Evansville only hire tree companies that are licensed by the City of Evansville and insured. Homeowners can call our office or check our web site to ensure such businesses are licensed (www.evansville.in.gov/urbanforestry). We also recommend to NEVER pay people up front to do tree work. Also, ask for a copy of their certificate of insurance and call their insurance company to verify the policy is still active. Don't hire companies that will not prove that they are insured.

If you are approached by someone going door to door looking for tree work or if you suspect they are not licensed by the City, please call the Dept. of Urban Forestry at 812-436-5752 to let us know.

Mayor Lloyd Winnecke will welcome the start of the holiday season with the lighting of the City of Evansville's official Christmas tree.

2019-20 Heating Advice to Stay Safe and Snug and Save Money

Button up your overcoat when the wind is free. Take good care of yourself, as the old song goes.

You can do that while you warm up to safety and savings. Fuel to heat our homes can mean high bills. And heating increases the risks of fire, explosion and carbon monoxide poisoning. But a heating system that works efficiently can mean more warmth, more safety—and more money left for other things.

The Evansville-Vanderburgh County Building Commission, Evansville Fire Department, Vanderburgh County township fire departments, American Red Cross, Vectren—a CenterPoint energy company and your local heating and air conditioning contractors want to alert the citizens of Evansville and Southwestern Indiana to the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning, fire and explosion from a malfunctioning furnace, a blocked flue or chimney, a broken gas line or inadequate air for combustion.

There may be hidden damage to your furnace, gas piping, flue or chimney. We are recommending that all citizens have their furnaces, space heaters, ranges, water heaters, gas lines, chimneys, flues and other heating equipment checked by a licensed heating contractor without delay. (You should do this every year.) You will protect yourself and your family this winter and save on heating bills.

Carbon monoxide replaces the oxygen in the air we breathe when fuel-burning equipment is operating and the vent or chimney is obstructed or there is not enough air to let the equipment burn fuel efficiently. Carbon monoxide is odorless, colorless and tasteless and catches its victims unaware, sometimes as they sleep. If you suspect a carbon monoxide problem, leave your home and call 911 or your local fire department.

Families in Evansville and across the country have been killed by carbon monoxide poisoning, and many others have become seriously ill. Symptoms may be similar to the flu, including headache, dizziness, nausea and shortness of breath. There may be chest pain, fatigue and confusion. **But you may go to sleep and never wake up.**

Always use portable generators <u>outdoors</u>, far away from the home and any openings. <u>Don't</u> use a range or oven for heat. Candle fires also have killed families. Be careful using candles during power outages and other times! And make a family fire escape plan.

The American Red Cross reminds you to use supplemental heat sources according to directions. (**Don't** use extension cords or power strips with space heaters.) Help alert your family with working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms. Regularly test the alarms and change any batteries, and **replace** the alarms as directed.

They Can Help

- American Red Cross volunteers will test smoke alarms and replace them free if needed, supply specialty alarms for deaf and hard of hearing residents and provide fire prevention information. Phone (812) 213-0540.
- Evansville Urban Enterprise Association offers free carbon monoxide alarms and smoke alarms, while supplies last, to residents of the Enterprise Zone and the service areas outside the zone who have not received them in the past. Phone (812) 426- 2490.
- Community Action Program of Evansville (CAPE) handles the Indiana Weatherization Assistance Program in Vanderburgh, Posey and Gibson counties. (Every county in Indiana has an agency for the weatherization program.) CAPE may repair or replace faulty heating equipment and make other energy-efficient improvements. CAPE also helps with heating bills. CAPE has income limits. Phone (812) 425-4241.
- Memorial Community Development Corp. offers emergency home repairs. The program covers repairs urgently needed to protect the residents. Homes must be owner -occupied, and there are income limits. Phone (812) 402-5530.
- Affordable Housing Advisory Committee Rehab Program helps qualified homeowners make needed housing improvements. The program may repair or replace heating units and make other winter-related improvements. The owner must occupy the home and meet income and other qualifications. Phone (812) 436-7823.
- **Vectren**, a CenterPoint energy company, has details on no-cost home energy assessments and energy-saving products, income-qualified weatherization and rebates for purchases of qualifying furnaces, programmable thermostats and insulation. Phone (866) 240-8476 or visit Vectren.com/SaveEnergy.
- Community One offers volunteer-based basic home repairs and weatherization to low-income people who own and occupy their homes, especially the elderly and disabled. Phone (812) 250-6888.
- Handy Chore will change furnace filters, install smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms, provide fire extinguishers, make some windows and doors weathertight, and repair storm doors and outer doors. Handy Chore serves homeowners who are disabled or at least age 60. Phone SWIRCA & More at (812) 464-7817.
