Steps to Reduce Risk of Getting COVID-19

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that we "practice everyday preventive actions to help reduce your risk of getting sick and remind everyone in your home to do the same. These actions are especially important for older adults and people who have severe chronic medical conditions:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick, except to get medical care.
- Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue and throw the tissue in the trash.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing; going to the bathroom; and before eating or preparing food.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. Always wash hands with soap and water if hands are visibly dirty.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces and objects, e.g. tables, countertops, light switches, doorknobs, and cabinet handles."

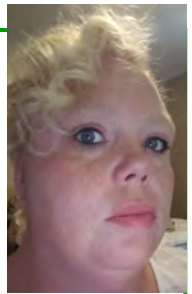

Unified Development Ordinance — What It Means to Every Neighborhood



The City of Evansville and Vanderburgh County agreed last year to pony up \$258,000 (half coming from each entity) to pay for an exhaustive and detailed revision of the building codes we have all lived by for decades.

The “Unified Code Ordinance” (UDO) is due to be unveiled the end of this year and it will, among many other things unify building codes in the City and in the county. It is being developed by Rundell, Ernstberger Associates of Indianapolis.

The project has been endorsed by Mayor Lloyd Winnecke, who said, “We have engaged them to draft a unified ordinance that protects what we have built and allow for us to grow and become an even more vibrant community.”

In a resolution passed by City Council, president Alex Burton wrote in support of the UDO including specific language that addresses housing, including the feasibility of reducing the required size of “buildable lots,” and addressing “antiquated” and “burdensome” parking regulations.

Here is an explanation of what the UDO will be, from www.community2020evc.com, the website dedicated to the Evansville project:

“Over the years, Evansville and Vanderburgh County’s development patterns have changed ... there have been several national trends that have affected the way communities like Evansville and Vanderburgh County address land use and development within the respective ordinances. Some changes include: shifting demographics; the shrinkage of medium density housing types (duplexes, triplexes etc.); increased options in transportation; an emphasis on creating authentic places; changes in communications; and technological advances. Increasingly, communities around the Country are responding and adapting to these changing conditions.

“A UDO is a legal document that combines the traditional zoning ordinance and subdivision regulations, along with other desired regulations such as design guidelines, sign regulations, etc. into one comprehensive document. The new UDO will govern land use, the subdivision of land, and development patterns in both Evansville and Vanderburgh County. This Ordinance will remove/replace out-of-date regulations, provide new processes, and incorporate flexibility in the Ordinance for more creative and appropriate development.

“The new UDO will contain tables and graphics, so it is easier to use and understand. It will also simplify the review processes to be less cumbersome and allow for developers, residents, and business owners to obtain approvals that are quicker and less cumbersome by navigating the regulations through a user-friendly format.”

Proper Recycling Is Beneficial to Our Community & the World

Being a Good Neighbor



For our neighbors in the city, Evansville provides a convenient single-streamed recycling program. This means residents don't need to sort their recyclables. The items can all go into the same cart.

The City encourage residents to recycle as much as possible to reduce the amount of waste going into our landfill, save trees by recycling paper products, and protect the ecosystem by keeping waste out of the environment. "On average, recycling costs U.S. communities \$30 per ton; landfilling costs \$50 per ton."

It's that simple. And yet, many residents complicate the process of handling recyclables by not knowing or not following the basics.

Placement/Removal of Carts

As per the City, "Trash and Recycling carts should not be placed out for collection more than one day before the scheduled day of collection." It is expected that "The same carts will be removed from the curb no later than 5:00 p.m. one day after the scheduled collection day."

What to Recycle & What Not to Recycle

See the lists to the right for the lists provided by the City. (We understand that the recycling of glass has been a challenge locally and in other areas. However, while the City's website still lists glass, we have included it too.)

CLEAN ALL ITEMS BEING RECYCLED!

Those who process the items from the single-stream system all too often find containers and other items with food residue or such on them. This calls for more time spent in sorting and produces more trash for the recycling facility to handle instead of spending time and resources on processing our recyclables.

CLEAN everything before tossing it into the recycling cart! Encourage your neighbors to do the same.

- ✓ corrugated cardboard

Containers Plastic/Metal/Glass

- ✓ aluminum, steel and bi-metal cans, lids and caps
- ✓ plastics marked #1-7 in the recycling symbol (bottles: milk, water, laundry, shampoo, conditioner, lotion & cosmetics; dairy tubs: butter, margarine, yogurt, sour cream, etc.)
- ✓ glass bottles, jugs & food/beverage containers
- ✓ lids can be left on the container/bottle



DO NOT RECYCLE THESE ITEMS

- ✗ tissue products or paper towels
- ✗ dairy or juice carton boxes (waxed cardboard)

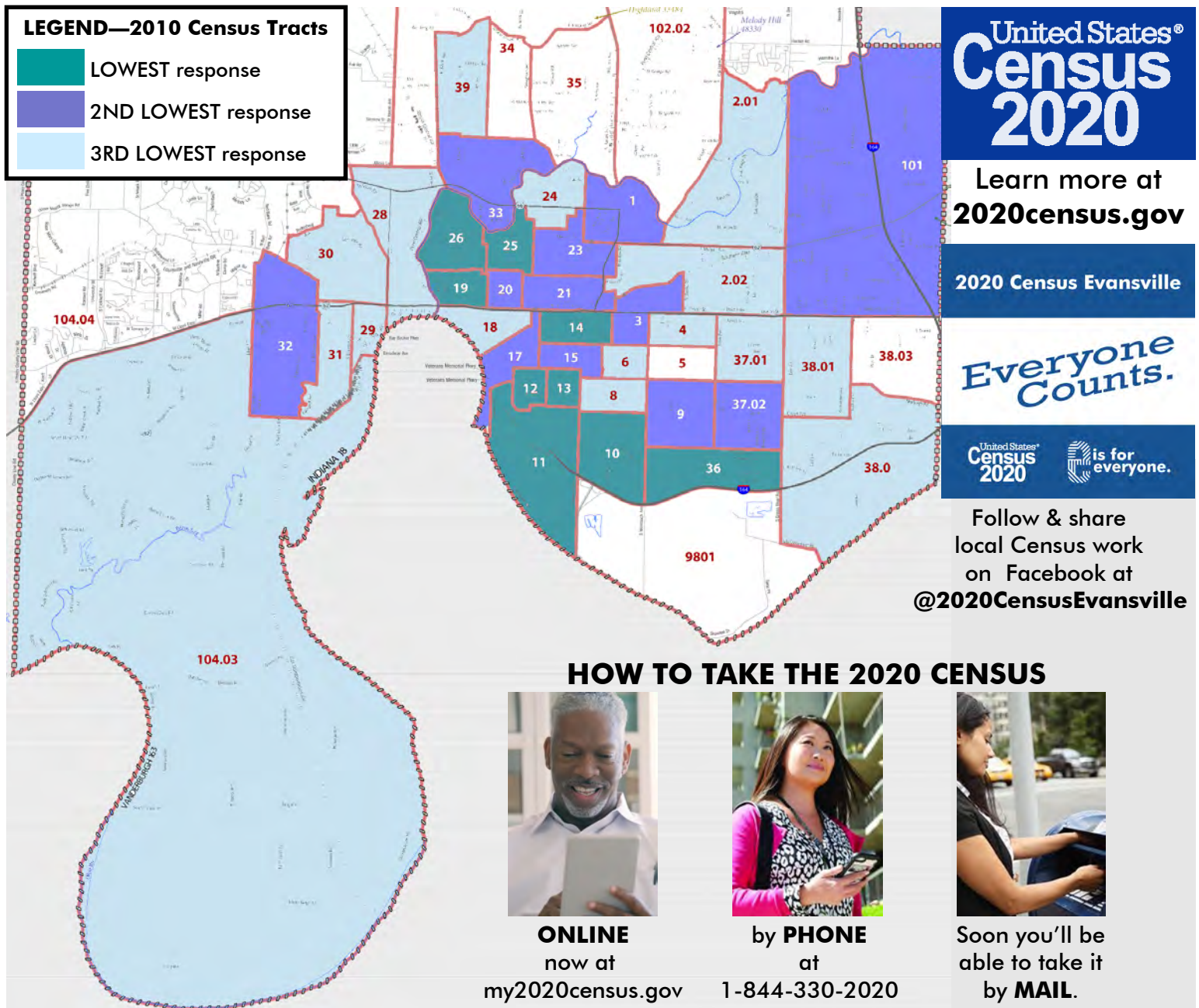
When you get your invitation to respond, talk it up among your neighbors and family members.

Those census tracts cover all or parts of these neighborhoods: Ballard, Bellemeade Bayard Park southwest, CCIA, CHAIN, the eastern side of Downtown, Culver, Eastview, Glenwood, Goosetown, Jacobsville, Knight, Old Erie east, STAR and Tepe Park.

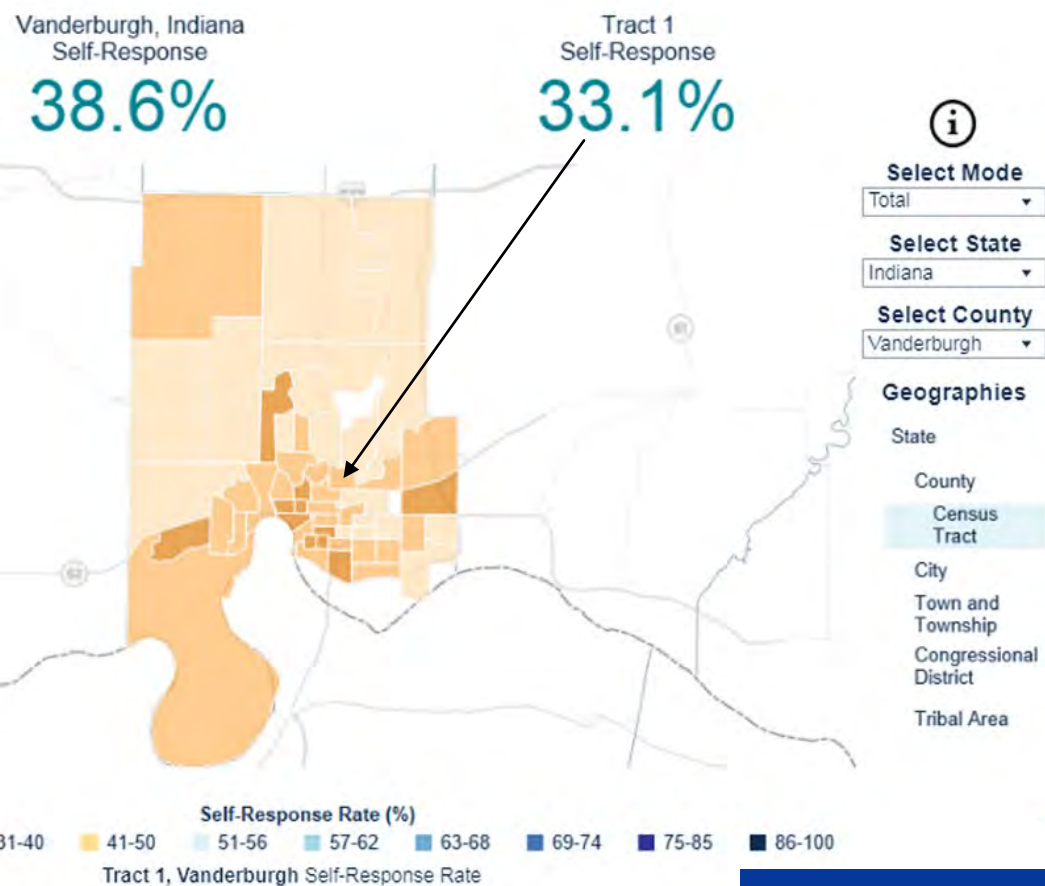

Beside the map, you can select the State, then County and then Census Tract to get a map like the one below. (NOTE: The bitly.com website allows us to shorten very long web addresses for ease of use in publications. It's legitimate.)

For example, by 12:00am on 3/31/20, our county was only at a 38.6% response rate. The darkest orange tracts indicate the tracts with the lowest responses so far. Those include all or portions of the following Neighborhoods: Bellemeade Bayard Park, CCIA, CHAIN, Culver, Downtown, Goosetown, Greater Lincolnshire, Jacobsville, Knight, STAR and Westside Improvement.

To Our Neighbors;

As you are probably aware, the Evansville Police Department is operating under historically unprecedented circumstances. It has been necessary for us to adapt procedures and interactions as health and safety concerns dictate. Our primary goal is—and always will be—to protect and serve the citizens and businesses of this community.

The CPO Unit is still active; Linda Jones is taking/logging concerns and complaints. Those problems *will* be addressed, but not in as timely a manner as before. Because of COVID 19, the department has instituted measures that place citizen and officer safety as our number one concern; all other issues will be prioritized. You can still leave messages and e-mails for CPOs but their assignments and responsibilities have also been adjusted; do not expect a quick reply. If a situation requires immediate attention, call 911; *do not depend on leaving a message if an emergency response is warranted.*

Information on Abandoned Vehicles continues to be registered; however, the towing company is closed so, again, action depends on the availability of resources. Deploying the Guardians is suspended for the present and graffiti removal has also been put on hold. We know you have questions about National Night Out—there are no answers except to promise we will announce the event's status as soon as there is one. If there is a change/cancellation of scheduled meetings (see attachment), you will be notified.

Like you, our routines and lives have taken a sudden, unexpected turn. And, like you, we continue to assess and meet challenges as they evolve. We are truly *all* in this together. But we have not forgotten our "Neighborhoods" and those of you who vigilantly serve this community. Be safe, watch out for each other, and we hope to see you soon.

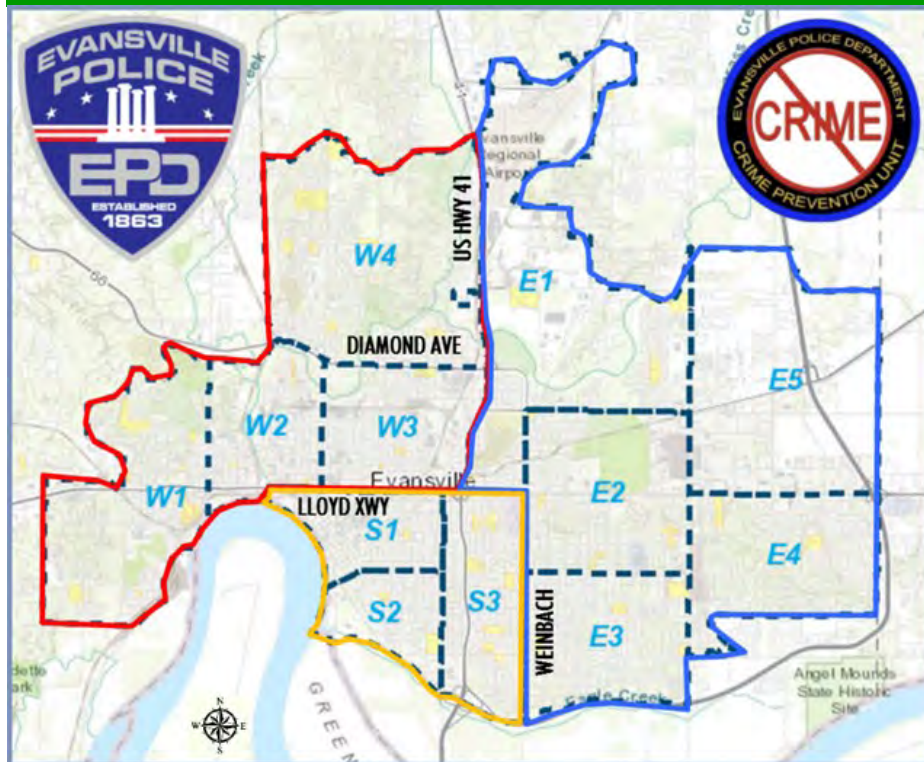

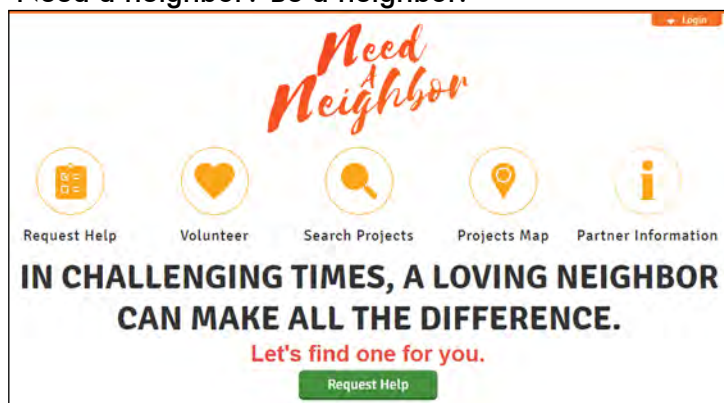

You can also submit a need on behalf of a family member or neighbor who may not know about *Need A Neighbor* or who may be unable to fill out the form.

Needs and personal information submitted through the website will be available only to volunteers approved by local churches, who will then be able to respond to those needs directly. *Need A Neighbor* cannot guarantee every need will be met or how quickly it will be met.

EWSU Launches Interactive Boil Advisory Map

Color-coded map displays Active and recently Lifted advisory areas

Now there is a fast and easy way for customers of the Evansville Water and Sewer Utility (EWSU) to determine if their property is under a Precautionary Boil Advisory. Evansville Water and Sewer Utility has launched an interactive, color-coded map that uses GIS technology to display the exact boundary of the area included in the advisory.

The new map is available on the utility's website at **www.ewsu.com** and can be accessed online, on your computer or wireless, on a smartphone or smart device.

Steps for Using the Interactive Map

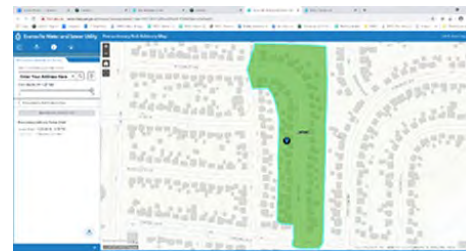
1. Look under **General Information**
2. Click the **Boil Advisory** tab. You can also find the link under **More Information**.
3. Scroll your mouse over **Notices and Information** for the dropdown menu.
4. Click **Boil Advisory**.
5. Visitors to the webpage will be prompted to **read the disclaimer** and click **OK**.
6. Enter your **street address** in the search box.
7. Click the **magnifying glass icon** on the search bar.
8. The GIS application will zoom in on the map and pinpoint the address entered.

Areas shaded in **red** indicate an *Active Precautionary Boil Advisory*. Information below the address search box will display the advisory status and the date and time the advisory

Lifted Precautionary Boil Map Example



Areas shaded in **green** indicate a *Lifted Precautionary Boil Advisory*, and information below the search box will include the date and time the advisory was issued and lifted. A lifted advisory will remain on the website for 72 hours from the time it was initially issued.
